FEDERAL & STATE INCENTIVES FOR HOME EFFICIENCY PROJECTS!

Since moving into our current home in 2016, my wife Karen and I knew we would need to replace several key systems. Heating? Check. Air conditioning? Check. Water heater? Check. Electrical service? Check and check.

But, we also knew that replacing such systems were big decisions that we'd need to be able to live with for 20 years or more. This was our chance to invest in some kind of "green" home energy technology, we thought. And then Russia invaded Ukraine, sending shockwaves across world energy markets. So what could we really do living in an old home, in an old city, with certain constraints and limitations.

Wind energy was out of the question. Can't imagine a windmill would pass covenant review.

Solar? Maybe. I investigated Tesla's solar tile product, which has an aesthetic similar to slate. But I learned our home has too much tree shade (a good thing!) and the tiles would only generate little more than a third of our daily electricity needs and would do nothing for our natural gas costs. Even with the 26 percent federal tax credit on energy efficient systems, buying the Tesla solar tiles was a non-starter at \$45,000+.

So I went back over the fine print in the federal tax credit and saw the word: geothermal. I knew a little about it, mostly in the context of the large geothermal plants that use extreme heat from deep within the earth to power electricity-generating power plants. Could I do that at my house?

Well, no, not quite. Residential geothermal systems rely on basic heat pump technology to heat and cool your home. A geothermal heat pump transfers heat back and forth from pipes installed in the ground outside a home, in what's called a closed loop system. From Energy.gov: "According to the EPA, geothermal heat pumps can reduce energy consumption -- and corresponding emissions -- up to 44% compared with air-source heat pumps and up to 72% compared with electric resistance heating with standard air-conditioning equipment."

For homes that have ample property, such a system can be installed in a horizontal formation, with excavation only going down around six feet. The temperature of the ground, at around 50-55 degrees Fahrenheit, provides a constant, stable source of temperature for the heat pump to use in heating and cooling a home.

For homes situated on smaller parcels of land, vertical loop systems are the only viable solution. However, vertical loops are more expensive because of the drilling with specialized equipment and more complex installation process as a result. Where horizontal loops can be installed several feet below grade, a similar length of ground loop installed in a vertical formation may need to go down 250 to 600 feet to meet your geothermal heat pump's energy exchange needs.

Bottom line: geothermal energy is still expensive and complicated to install for urban home owners — unless you're able to line up a good set of tax credits. It does offer significant energy savings, and contractors have become increasingly adept at installing such systems in urban environs.

Our contractor was one of them. All things considered, the vertical drilling and trench work wasn't as bad as we feared, partly because we didn't hit much water. We asked many questions and they did a good job of setting our expectations, including how the project had multiple phases that could take a few weeks to go from drilling and trenching to hookup and final install.

Finally, and most importantly: the money question. How much does such a system typically cost?

A geothermal system for a 2,000 square foot home, with vertical drilling, could cost \$35,000 to \$45,000, with vertical drilling accounting for 30 to 40 percent of that expense. We are taking advantage of the following tax credits and other subsidies: 1) Federal: 26 percent off; 2) State (Md Historical Revitalization Tax Credit): 20 percent off; 3) State:

\$3,000 grant from MD Energy Administration for new geothermal system; 4) State: Annual sale of our Renewable Energy Credits (RECs) with expected reimbursement of \$600-900 per year. There are also some special financing options available that help geothermal system buyers defer some costs until after they've received the tax credit in their subsequent tax filing.

All these combined tax credits knock off around 50 percent of the total project cost. Additionally, Maryland's Renewable Energy Credit marketplace allows homeowners to get a check every year their system is in operation. Between monthly savings on the energy bill and the renewable energy credits marketplace dropping a check in the mail once a year, we expect to recoup the cost of the system in five to ten years.

We moved quickly on this project in 2022, with the assumption that the 26% tax credit was scheduled to be reduced in future tax years. But now that the Inflation Reduction Act has been passed and signed, homeowners can tap into tax credits for geothermal and other energy-saving measures for years to come.

Now in their second home in Original Northwood, Gus and Karen Sentementes have lived in the neighborhood since 2006.

Maintenance Update

This is my last contribution to the newsletter as the maintenance chair for the community. I'd like to start by thanking all of the neighbors who've supported litter walks, dumpster days, and continue to volunteer to make our neighborhood a great place to live. Colin Geis, the new maintenance chair, is seen – often daily – picking up litter while he walks the community. That spirit of contributing to the greater good of our neighborhood is what makes Original Northwood special!

Now – some thoughts and suggestions on Fall maintenance, particularly for our new homeowners who may not have a lot of experience with managing a house.

- Leaves management. Many people spend a lot of effort in the fall cleaning up leaves as they drop from their trees. I always used to scour the yard for every leaf I could find so they were gone before December. However conservationists now encourage us to "leave the leaves" for the Winter! The dead leaves provide important shelter and food for insects and wildlife, and can help fertilize flower beds. So this year, consider holding off your major leaf cleanup until the Spring! If you like seeing lightning bugs in the summer, then put your rakes away. ONE HINT: I do suggest that you get the leaves off of your lawn and into your flowerbeds. It helps to run over them with a lawnmower and spread them in your beds using the mower bag.
- **Tree management.** This is the time of year to have your trees checked for pruning. Do you have trees that are growing over your roof? Do your tree limbs go over your neighbor's property? Do you have trees frequently dropping branches? Consider having a general health check and appropriate pruning. IF you have dead trees on your property, please get them taken down to protect your AND your neighbors' property.
- Hose bibs. As the weather dips closer to freezing, make sure to remove hoses from your exterior hose bibs and store them indoors. Turn off the valves to your hose bibs and consider getting insulated covers for them. They sell them pretty cheaply on Amazon, and Ace Hardware in Waverly also has them.

Finally – note that the final dumpster day of 2022 will be on **Saturday, November 19**. Colin will put info on Nextdoor to let people know the time and the location of the dumpster. Have a great end to 2022 and start to 2023!

Safety Update

The rates for most types of crime in Baltimore and the Northeastern District have increased in 2022 over 2021. Some of this can be attributed to 2021 being a relatively good year statistically, but the trend is still frustrating. Thankfully, as usual, Original Northwood has been spared much of that activity and remains a safe and peaceful neighborhood on the whole. Also encouraging is the fact that the latter half of the year thus far has been better than the first. Regardless, we can help limit crime in our neighborhood, block, and home by following (and continuing to follow) some good practices.


Limit opportunities. Don't leave valuables (even a change tray can be valuable to burglars) in cars, lock your doors, stay alert and avoid potentially dangerous situations, light the exterior of your house and purchase a video doorbell or security camera. These simple deterrents are recommended by law enforcement across the country. Communicate and use the interpersonal networks available to you. Family, friends, and neighbors are always

around to help keep us safe, ask them to keep an eye out when leaving home and walk each other to the car if you're coming or going late. If you see something, say something - report suspicious activity and any criminal activity to the police, the ONA board, and on social media like the Original Northwood group on Nextdoor. Reporting to the police is essential for giving them an accurate view of the neighborhood and informs their patrol strategies.

I'd like to reiterate the suggestion to ask neighbors to keep an eye out – one of the best things about our neighborhood is the sense of community. If you don't know your neighbors, this is a good opportunity to reach out, build that sense of community, and keep each other safer.

Light Up ONA Initiative

We are so fortunate to live in a neighborhood with ample lighting. Our alley way street lights are adequately placed providing an abundance of light when working properly. Our street lights are strategically placed throughout the neighborhood providing ample lighting when working properly for neighbors to feel safe while walking dogs after dark or taking an early morning stroll. To keep the neighborhood bright and well lit, please report to BGE when you see a street light out in the neighborhood. BGE has made it extremely easy to do this. Download their app and simply report a street light outage. You don't have to register, just continue as a guest to report an outage.



This time of year means less daylight. It might be dark when you leave the home in the morning and dark again when you get home for the day. We can help light up the neighborhood more by turning on an outdoor light, porch light or string lights to provide more lighting throughout the neighborhood. There are many cost effective ways of doing this nowadays, solar spotlights or solar string lights, which can be found at your local hardware store.

Let's light up the neighborhood and keep our community bright and safe.

Neighborhood Walkthrough with Elected Officials

We were recently able to host our elected city officials Council members Ryan Dorsey and Odette Ramos on walkthroughs on both the north and south side of Original Northwood. For those of you who don't know, neighbors living north of Argonne Drive are in Ryan's district and those living south of Argonne are in Odette's district.

These walkthroughs gave the council members an opportunity to meet with concerned neighbors on a stroll through the streets and alleyways. While we discussed outstanding housing code violations, we also had an opportunity to enjoy beautiful yards and gardens and to learn more about city regulations., discuss housing and other concerns.

It is hoped that this can be a regular event to continue the close support that we received from our council members. Coupled with the Maintenance Walkthrough with the Baltimore City Department of Housing & Community Development, we hope to ensure the maintenance and beauty of our neighborhood.

I would also like to explore the idea of individual streets hosting mini block parties for National Night Out. Please vote your interest in seeing these proposed events implemented here.


