THE WINTER SAFETY UPDATE

Watch for door-to-door solicitations; use the salt boxes; be vigilant against street robberies

As the weather turns colder, please be mindful of your neighbors and help out whenever possible.

There are just a few updates to share this time around relating to Original Northwood safety.

- Recently, posts on Nextdoor have indicated an increase in the amount of door-to-door solicitation occurring in the area. Please be mindful of visitors and if you are concerned, do not open the door. The Northeast District has shared details relating to a few individuals who were in the area soliciting services as impersonators. If you are concerned, please do not open the door and call 911 to alert the police.
- As we begin to experience snow and ice, please make use of the salt boxes in the neighborhood. All were checked in late December and had adequate supplies.

We received the following updates from the Baltimore City Northeast Police District:

- "There has been a spike citywide in robberies. Suspects have been driving around targeting persons who are preoccupied with using their cellphone in various capacities, i.e. talking, listening to music, taking pictures, etc. The Baltimore Police Department has identified several persons of interest in some of these cases and is actively investigating all leads obtained. Some of these robberies have occurred at or near public transportation hubs. The Northeast District, in collaboration with area law enforcement agencies, are putting together initiatives to prevent the robberies and arrest those responsible for any committed. If you know of any persons committing robberies and or any type of crime please call 1-866-7lockup or text 443-902-4824 with tips. All calls remain anonymous as well as tips received via text."
- "There has been an increase in burglaries in the Bel Air/Edison community. The burglaries have occurred primarily during the day between the hours of 11AM and 4PM. Suspects have entered through unlocked doors and windows or through broken windows and doors. The majority of the burglary suspects have entered at the rear of the locations. Our Officers have increased patrols in the alleys and have increased car stops in this and other areas. For those residents who are able to be home during the day, we ask your help in identifying suspicious persons, vehicles, actions in your neighborhood, with special attention to the rear of your neighbor's home. The person who has on a work uniform may not be conducting legitimate business, get to know your neighbors and their patterns. We are all in this together and need your eyes to be our eyes."

Please review these overall tips from the Baltimore City Northeast Police District

- This is robbery and burglary season for the Northeast District.
 - o Please continue to follow these guidelines in order to stay safe and crimes free this season.
 - o Avoid using ATMs late at night
 - o Avoid bringing in large items to your house late at night
 - o Keep all doors (car and house) locked at all times
 - o Remove valuables from your vehicle at night
 - o Try to get gas before sundown
 - o Break down electronics and appliance boxes and place in a trash bag before disposing of the boxes
- These are just a few tips to help out during the season but no tip can replace good old-fashioned instincts.
 If something doesn't look right or feel right then assume it's not right and react accordingly.
- We are experiencing robberies along our Loch Raven and Alameda corridor.
 - o Suspect descriptions vary so please stay vigilant while out.

If you see anything or anyone that looks suspicious, don't hesitate to dial 911

In Original Northwood, the Safety Committee will begin Turn on Tuesday's and Thursday's in the neighborhood. Please be on the lookout for flyers being placed in doorways in the next few days with reminders. The goal is to turn on your front porch/back porch light from sundown to sun-up. It was an initiative started under our last safety chair and I would like to expand it.

Architecture firm chosen; UDARP planning begins; some leases signed

If you're anything like me, you may drive by or through the plaza wondering what's happening these days. According to Mark Renbaum in mi-December, below is the latest information. As we get more information about changes and updates, we will share via NextDoor and other outlets.

- An architecture firm has been chosen. JP2 Architects, who were involved with the Wegman's in Owings Mills, among other things, is the firm.
- Things are being prepared for UDARP (Urban Design Architectural Review Panel) where there will be public hearings announced for neighbors to attend.
- There are several businesses that have signed leases and/or letters of intent.
 - o Chipotle, Sunny's, Subway, DTLR, Barnes & Noble, Starbucks, Panda King
 - o They are still seeking a dry cleaners pizza establishment, wine & spirits store, and a sit-down chef restaurant
- They're working with two major medical groups in hopes of finalizing with one for 5,000 sq. ft. Patient First type place.
- They are **not** currently pursuing housing
- The goal is to begin demo in the spring but stay tuned.

As meetings are scheduled, I will continue to communicate the information. As you know, we will need to continue to work together and with surrounding neighbors to communicate our needs and wants!

YOUTH JOBS FOR THE SUMMER: APPLY NOW!

City launches program to employ youth in summer months

Baltimore city residents have long decried the limited opportunities for employment for our youth. A new city program aims to change that in the summer of 2017.

This month, the Mayor's Office of Employment Development opened the online application process for recruiting city residents between the ages of 14 to 21 for jobs for local nonprofit and for-profit enterprises. The YouthWorks summer jobs program will operate two, five-week sessions, the first beginning June 26 and the second on July 10, according to the mayor's office.

According to the mayor's website: The online application is the first step of the YouthWorks summer jobs registration and will remain available for Baltimore City residents through Friday, March 10, 2017. Everyone who applies will be required to attend an in-person certification appointment in order to be eligible for a YouthWorks job. These certification appointments will be conducted after school and on Saturdays from late January through March.




ONA TREASURER'S UPDATE — 2016 IN REVIEW

In 2016, ONA membership was slightly down (139 households, representing 38 percent of all households in the community) from 2015 levels (42 percent%), but on the positive side it was more balanced through the neighborhood than in the previous year, with Loch Raven and Roundtop showing substantially increased membership. Thank you!



Overall, ONA membership contributions brought in \$5,700. Other forms of revenue included \$1,265 in social contributions; \$310 in newsletter advertising, and a small bank adjustment windfall (\$5) for a total of **\$7,280** incoming funds for the year. We can add to this amount \$2,023 in advance funds received from the GNCA in 2015 to cover 2016 payments for capital investments that included final payment on the new ONA sign at the corner of Argonne and the Alameda, tree plantings and other landscaping plantings and services.



As for community expenses, social events represent just over half of all expenditures (\$5,503) for the year; followed by maintenance costs (\$2,271), though these are largely offset by the GNCA advance of \$2,023 received in 2015. Communications expenses (\$1,604) were incurred for printing of quarterly newsletters and various flyers, and hosting of the ONA website.

Administrative costs (\$1,125) represent print materials prepared for ONA's participation in Live Baltimore; Board candidate Meet & Greet events, and various postal mailings; while Covenant expenses (\$237) were incurred for registered letters specifically mailed as notifications of covenant infractions.

Our ONA bank account balance changed from **\$20,903.11** at the beginning of 2016, to **\$17,443.49** at year's end, for a net reduction of \$3,459.62. Excluding \$2,023 of this amount which represents the GNCA advance received in 2015, expenditures exceeded receipts by **\$1,437** in 2016.

Commission for Historical Architectural Preservation (CHAP) - Over the past year, the association has begun the exploratory process of CHAP and if it's something residents would like to pursue here. Mary Stevenson has worked with CHAP staff in getting information, setting up Q&A sessions, and in preparing packets of information for residents to review. While surveys were sent out through our association and from CHAP, with a number of responses, we have also heard from residents who need more information and/or more time to make an informed decision. At this time, we have put the CHAP process on hold, in hopes of giving residents more time to review the information, ask questions, and make an informed decision, whether for or against the CHAP designation. Our plan is to do more outreach across the neighborhood, so stay tuned. I do not currently have a new date of when we will finalize survey results and move forward with the process, but we will be sure to inform residents in advance. 

NEW YEAR'S RESOLUTIONS FOR YOUR HOME

Plan a Budget for Improvements

During the winter when the doors and windows are closed the air is full of possible contaminants such as dust, mold spores, and viruses. Make sure the ventilation systems in your home exhaust air to the outside rather than in an attic or between ceiling joints. You can also purchase a portable air purifier for each room to remove pollutants.
